



BEST PRACTICE -1

1. Title of the Practice: Evangelical Union, FAC.

2. Goal:

This practise has the following goals:

- a. To counsel students on personal and social relationship
- b. To target students who live away from their parents and guardians, i.e., the hostellers and those who live in rented houses within the campus
- c. To train them to develop leadership skills by taking part in various activities like delivering sermons, invoking prayers, singing, playing musical instruments, organising events, praise and worship events and so on.
- d. To give them lessons on moral and ethical strength.
- 3. **The Context**: The Evangelical Union, FAC is affiliated to the Union of Evangelical Students of India (UESI). This has been initiated in order to guide the hostellers and students staying within the campus mentally as well as spiritually. While the College tries its utmost to provide a wide range of subject combinations, it also realizes that the EQ of the students need to be developed. Students who come to take up various undergraduate courses belong to a phase where they are exploring new options in their career as well as in their relationships and social circles. The College has entrusted certain teachers as advisors and Treasurer of the EU to impart spiritual understanding and also to counsel them on personal matters of relationships and mental stress.

4. The Practice:

- a. The EU organises Camps every year where renowned speakers are invited to speak on different spiritual and well being topics.
- b. The EU regularly organizes fellowships every Sunday, mentoring meetings every Friday and spiritual strengthening meetings every Tuesday, where students take the platform.
- c. The EU organises community work at regular intervals.
- d. The EU organises sales day on certain occasions to generate fund for the Union.
- e. There is one to one mentorship between students (students mentoring each other)
- f. Students are given a platform for sharing their testimony.
- g. The College has constituted an Award for EU student of the year.

5. Evidence of success:

- a. Almost all the hostellers acquire excellent leadership and communication skills.
- b. They become mentally and spiritually strong in their daily performances and their relationships with others.
- c. They become well equipped to mentors and set good examples for their peers.
- d. The EU, FAC has received the Best Campers Award.

6. Problems encountered and Resources Required:

- a. Distance: Because of the distance from the town, procurement of human resources becomes difficult.
- b. Financial constraints: The EU is self supported. Because of the tight academic schedule it is difficult for the students to engage in fund raise programmes.
- c. Lack of infrastructure
- d. Lack of improved sound systems and musical instruments.
- e. Due to lack of faculty quarters, many teachers reside far from the campus. Therefore teachers involvement is minimised.
